Dear Friends,

As a valuable member of our Community Action family, we are very pleased to share with you our 1999-2000 annual report of our many activities and accomplishments over the last year. Thanks to the powerful partnerships we hold with you—donors, volunteers, businesses, grantors, and policy makers—we responded to more than 23,000 requests for assistance from low-income individuals last year. Some other highlights include:

- Partnering with Tualatin Valley Cable Access to produce "When Ends Don't Meet", a documentary on the struggles faced by working families who earn low wages.
- Partnering with Washington County and East County leaders to reopen the homeless shelter (RITE Center) in Tigard, help establish a new non-profit to take over operations and identify new sources of needed funding. The shelter, now known as the Good Neighbor Center, prevented the destitution of 220 homeless people.
- Expanding the low-income energy assistance program, as a result of electrical deregulation, preventing 3,296 households from losing their heat and utilities, serving four times more households than last year.
- Implementing a resource development capacity building plan, which resulted in a 52% increase in financial support from private donors to support our mission.

In addition to these successes, CAO has undergone some significant changes. We have carefully assessed our needs for private funds, our ability to deliver multiple services and our administrative capacity. We have taken the necessary steps to strengthen our operations in each of these areas and let go of services that were not adequately funded, finding new providers for these programs. As a result, CAO's programs are more focused and are financially sustainable.

Community Action's future is dedicated to helping low-income families and children achieve a better life. We are committed to working with community partners who are so critical to building a healthy community. We thank you for being a caring member of the Community Action family. Please let us know of your special interest in our work. With your support, we will continue to provide leadership in the area of low-income programs and services that provide the opportunities needed for every low-income child and family to succeed.

We look forward to our continued work together.

Community Action Organization (CAO), a private, non-profit agency, is the largest provider of early childhood education, family and child support services, and emergency basic needs services for low-income residents of Washington County. Our vision is to create a community where residents are strong, resilient, involved in the community, and live with dignity and security. Community Resources



HOUSING SERVICES AND EMERGENCY NEEDS

More than 8,000 Washington County residents face homelessness every year, primarily due to economic reasons. Community Action offers a wide variety of services to prevent homelessness and meet emergency and basic needs.

Accomplishments-

- Prevented the destitution of 438 homeless people by providing shelter and support services for:
 -67 families at the CAO Hillsboro Family Shelter
 -75 families at the Good Neighbor Center in Tigard
- Prevented homelessness for 398 families by providing rent assistance.
- Prevented 3,518 families from experiencing hunger by connecting them with emergency food boxes.
- Prepared 104 low-income families to obtain and maintain housing by providing tenant education outlining their rights and responsibilities as tenants.
- Stabilized housing for 168 families who had histories of homelessness by providing long-term comprehensive social
 service support.
- Provided hundreds of low-income families more than 60,000 items of clothing and small household goods from our Play It Again free clothes closet.

After falling into financial difficulty due to complications in a pregnancy and a serious illness that prevented her from being able to continue working, Gale struggled to support her newborn baby girl and had to foreclose on her house. She came to the Hillsboro Family Shelter for help and a safe place to stay. CAO was able to provide her with referrals for information on housing, child care and educational programs. Gale told us, 'I left the shelter with a feeling I have a bunch of people behind me, pulling for me, and that's a good feeling." With some assistance, Gale and her daughter were eventually able to move into their own apartment.

Community Resources

ENERGY ASSISTANCE & WEATHERIZATION

Many low-income residents of Washington County must choose between going hungry or being cold. Our energy assistance and weatherization programs prevent utility shut offs, lower fuel costs, and allow those in need to stay in their homes.

Accomplishments-

- Provided comprehensive energy conservation education for 1,860 households to help them lower their energy costs.
- Prevented 3,296 households from losing their heat and utilities by offering financial assistance, serving four times more households than last year.
- Prevented 101 low-income households from illness, suffering and economic crisis by weatherizing their homes.

A single mother needed energy assistance when, while between jobs, her power was shut off. She wrote to CAO, 'It helps greatly to have a program or some kind of assistance available to help you when times get tough."

INFORMATION & REFERRAL

CAO offers information and referral (I & R) to connect people with needed community services, to provide eligibility screening and assessment for various programs, and to assist with basic emergency needs to alleviate short term crisis. CAO, with support from the community, created the FIND database to enable clients and others to access information via the internet.

Accomplishments-

- Provided 11,956 people with information and referrals to needed services, giving them hope for the future.
- Supported an I & R provider network by facilitating regular information-sharing breakfasts, including system training.
- Increased access to I & R information by: -printing and distributing a directory to multiple organizations -partnering with the Washington County Cooperative Libraries to include access to I & R on their network
 -establishing the I & R directory on the internet



Child and Family Support



OPENING DOORS

To achieve positive birth outcomes, Opening Doors seeks out low-income pregnant women who are not receiving prenatal care; motivates them to seek care; and provides the needed information, referral and advocacy to enable them to do so. Services are provided by trained lay health workers, who share similar life experiences with the women they serve. Opening Doors works through collaborative efforts and financial support of key healthcare providers and insurers in the area.

Accomplishments—

- Ensured healthy pregnancies for 318 low-income women by connecting them with on-going prenatal care and support services, resulting in 96% of their babies being born with a healthy birthweight.
- Connected 100% of babies born to clients with medical insurance upon leaving the program.

A KID'S DOMAIN

CAO operates A Kid's Domain to provide low-income families with safe, affordable care for their school-aged children. Program curriculum includes one-on-one tutoring, sports, arts and crafts, games and field trips and is offered at four public elementary schools.

Accomplishments-

- Provided 118 children with a fun, safe place to go before and after school while their parents were at work.
- Increased understanding of Math and English by providing tutoring after-school for 105 students.

Child and Family Support

METRO CHILD CARE RESOURCE & REFERRAL SERVICES

Metro CCR&R is strengthening the local child care and education system by providing information, support and education to parents, providers, employers and the community. By increasing parents' and child care providers' knowledge of child development and education issues, we are improving the quality of child care and school readiness in children.

Accomplishments-

- Connected 1,998 parents in Washington
- County with referrals to help them find child care.
- Provided 39 child care providers with on-site training to promote preschool childrens' literacy through The Learning Circle program.
- Trained 679 child care providers in child development, helping them to provide enriching and age-appropriate activities for the children in their care.
- Certified 196 child care providers in First Aid, 201 in CPR, and 139 in Food Handling, allowing them to provide the safest environment for the children in their care.



ABC SOUP

A BC Soup is a children's nutrition program available to registered family child care providers to promote nutritious meals for children in their care. Providers receive education on proper nutrition for infants and children, menu guidance and reimbursement for meals.

Accomplishments-

• Supported 431 child care providers who planned and served balanced meals to 4,482 children, assuring good nutrition.

Early Childhood Development



HEAD START

Head Start is a federal and state funded preschool program for three- and four-year olds whose family income falls below the poverty level. Children enrolled in Head Start receive a physical exam, a nutritional and growth assessment, vision and hearing screening, and social, emotional, and developmental screening. Head Start places a major emphasis on parental involvement by encouraging parents to help out in the classrooms, to serve on the governing board, or take advantage of educational opportunities including literacy, parenting and child development.

Accomplishments-

- Brought 529 children in 15 sites throughout Washington County to a level of health, social and educational readiness to assure their success in school.
- Fully immunized 100% of children enrolled.
- Completely resolved 99% of over 200 identified health and developmental concerns by year-end.
- Implemented full day/full year services in collaboration with Adult and Family Services, supporting in-home child care providers with Head Start curriculum.
- Conducted 1,460 home visits that included educational content • for parents and children as well as family development activites.
- Each family, on average, volunteered more than 19 hours in the classroom or participated at family events.
- Parents led 330 activities in Head Start classrooms.
- Conducted more than 1,050 parent-teacher conferences, establishing goals and reviewing each child's progress.

Rosé told CAO that the best day of her life was when her son Christopher entered Head Start. She enjoyed watching him grow in the program, getting involved in his class, and going to parent meetings. Eventually, Rose became a teacher's assistant at Head Start and has since been working hard studying for her GED certificate and raising her family at the same time.

Resource Development

FUNDRAISING

C ontributions from private donors such as families, the faith community, service organizations, corporations, foundations, United Way, and many friends are instrumental in complimenting public grants in order to fully cover the cost of operating Community Action programs.

Accomplishments—

- Exceeded fundraising goal by raising \$773,000 from private sources, 52% more than the previous year.
- With the support of a \$250,000 grant from the Meyer Memorial Trust, we implemented the first phase of a three-year development capacity building plan to raise more private contributions to accommodate rapidly expanding programs.
- Received in-kind gifts with a total value of \$140,750.

VOLUNTEER INVOLVEMENT

Whether its preparing meals, tutoring children, building play grounds, trouble-shooting computer software problems, assembling mailings, or managing a free clothing store, hundreds of people play a critical role in the work to assist low-income families on the road to self-sufficiency.

Accomplishments—

- Coordinated more than 2,853 volunteers, including hundreds of individuals who helped re-open, furnish and provide food and clothing for homeless families at the Good Neighbor Center in Tigard.
- Mentored dozens of Head Start students, made significant improvements to the Hillsboro Family Shelter, and upgraded agency computers to make them Y2K compliant with the help of employees from local businesses who volunteered their time during corporate community service projects.
- Re-opened and operated a free clothing closet completely run by volunteers so hundreds of low-income families could "shop" for needed clothing items.
