## **County counts homeless**

Forest Grove Elks, Hillsboro church connect folks living outside with aid

Washington County homeless residents had several chances this past week to get a hot meal, stock up on warm clothing, look into housing options -- and be recognized.

As part of the Point-in-Time (PIT) Homeless Count organized by the Washington County Community Action team, local organizations opened their doors to the homeless, offering free food and services while they tried to get an accurate count of the county's homeless population.

The 2013 count revealed there were more than 1,100 homeless people living in Washington County based on the state's definition of homelessness, whose meaning has expanded to include those staving with other people due to loss of housing, economic hardship or personal

"We wanted to get together as many organizations as possible to be as effective as possible.". said Jessie Adams of Community Action, who added that each year the count gets a little more from Washington County about accurate and adds more servic-. es. Adams helped homeless vet-

erans get screened for any benefits for which they might qualify.

The Department of Housing and Urban Development - the federal agency that oversees home ownership, lowincome housing assistance, aid for distressed' neighborhoods and homelessness - requires the homeless count to take place in

January.

"The numbers we come up. with determine the federal money HUD gives out," Pomeroy said. "But most of our homeless population goes south for the winter."

Washington County recently received a grant for more than, \$40,000 from the Oregon Department of Veterans' Affairs to help." with outreach.
