# NOTES ON PAST SPECIAL SESSION Semante flutoria

Rough Proft

1865 - December 5 - Governor Addison Gibbs called session to 14 days adopt Anti-Slavery resolution for national Constitution Amendment - Gibbs, founder of Gardner (Umpqua County) -Lawyer and jurist, made a most brilliant and persuasive speech to the legislature against slavery.

1885 - November 11 - Governor Zenas Ferry Moody, merchant, 14 days exporter - called a session to fill vacancy in U. S. Senate post, John Hipple Mitchel, and correct defects in laws passed previous session - sought no new legislation.

1898 - September 26 - Governor William Pine Lord, lawyer,
 20 Days soldier, jurist, ambassador, called a session because the legislature failed to organize in 1897 - purpose to elect U. S. Senator, Joseph Simon. Attend appropriations, provide for International Exposition and general considerations.

- 1903 December 21 Governor Geo. Chamberlain, lawyer, Attorney
   3 Days General, U. S. Senator called a session to correct defects in taxation legislation enacted at the 22nd regular session of 1903, said defects were subject of objections by Oregon Supreme Court.
- 1909 March 15 Governor Frank Benson educator, lawyer, former
   2 Days Secretary of State, called session for purpose of passing an appropriation bill covering operations of State Insane Asylum, penitentiary, State Reform School, Oregon Institute for the Blind, State Feebleminded Home, and others as carried in SB 254 upon which final action was inadvertently overlooked during the regular session.

1920 - January 12 - Governor Ben W. Olcott, banker, Alaskan gold
6 Days dust buyer, insurance broker, farmer, brother-in-law of
Governor Os. West, and former Secretary of State, called a

special session to meet emergency problems of Workmen's Compensation which was established in 1913; and to legislatively solve Irrigation Bond obstacles relating to the State Guarantee on Bond interest; to restore Capital Punishment because of the increasing number of "fiendish homicides"; to amend the parole law "so that it will cease to function as to all persons convicted of graver crimes against the person."

1921 December 19 - Governor Ben W. Olcott qv. - called a special session to submit to the people at the primary 6 Days election, May 1922, the matter of whether the State of Oregon shall by general taxation bear a share of the burden of the International Exhibition, proposed for 1925 in Oregon; to enact laws for preservation of Highways." This included limitation on weight of loads and speeds of motor trucks, control of passenger buses and vehicles used for hire and creation of revenue.

Government, merchant, promoter of Oregon 1933 -January 3 Highways, called a special session in compliance with 10-5 Days section 2 and 6 of Article IX, Oregon Constitution requiring legislature to convene and levy a tax to compensate for 20 Days fiscal deficiency of the state and to defray expenses of the The problem developed largely through ensuring fiscal year. Governor Pierce's successful efforts to reduce property taxes and to the repeal by the electorate of the state income tax. This was a post depression era.

Governor Julies Meer gv November 20 - The second special session was called to devise a mechanism for cooperation with the federal government in providing relief for thousands of citizens in distress because of unemployment. A fund of \$8,000,000 was estimated to be required for the period of October 1933 to December 31, 1934, the state put up \$2.00 for every \$1.00 advanced by the federal government. The issue of liquor sales and control was also involved; as was financial plight of school districts and practices of utility companies.

1935 - October 21 - Governor Charles H. Martin, soldier,
20 days legislator, anti - labor and anti - Roosevelt campaigner, called the special session to provide for a new capitol. Oregon's beautiful historic capitol built in 1873, burned April 25, 1935. In his speech he advocated the Candalaria Heights site - it being low priced vacant land at the time.

1957 - October 28 - Governor Robert D. Holmes, known as Mr.

1971 - November 16 - Governor McCall q.v. - called the 7 days session to solve problems of a deficit that "crash landed" on state affairs, and to pass a farm labor management bill... this to minimize strike and distribution in Oregon's agriculture labor force.

1974 - January 24 - Governor McCall q.v. - called this session
 14 days primarily to correct defects in the so called "Land Consumer
 Note: Protection Act," H.B. 2607, enacted at the previous regular
 recess session. The legislature attended to the problem in a
 Jan 24 one day session. The action taken freed the flow of House
 Feb 11 financing that had been temporarily interrupted by
 interpretations of the bill. The second reason for the
 call was to cope with energy resource emergencies.

1975 - September 16 - Robert W. Straub, Land Developer, farmer, 1 day conservationist, legislator, called a special session to cure defects in House Bill 2579 relating to limitation of access to criminal records. The Attorney General held the bill to be unconstitutional, other legal remedies such as executive orders and judicial reviews seemed not to provide an adequate solution to the restrictions imposed by the bill.

1978 - September 5 - Governor Straub, q.v. - called the session
5 days to develop tax relief proposals as acceptable alternative to Proposition 6 with its 1 - 1/2 % property tax limitation.

Note: It appears there were two additional special sessions one in 1859 and 1860, adequate supporting information has not been assembled at this time.
