Dear Brother,

Your kind letter came to hand a day or two ago, and I hasten to answer,

We parted as you know at Omaha, at which place we stayed all night with a Nephew (Dr James Search) and the next morning took the B. & M. in Neb and went by the way of ~~Elk Creek~~ Lincoln to Elk Creek near which our daughter lives, with whom we had a pleasant visit. After staying until the next Monday we started for home where we arrived on Tuesday at 8.53 A.M. We found all the folks well,

While we were absent the bank at this place broke by which we lost \$1305, which makes us feel rather slim in regard to money matters,

But we have faith to believe that somehow  
or another the Lord will provide.

Our health is not good, and from present  
indications, we will want but little, nor  
want that little long, I cough a great deal  
and expectorate quite freely my left lung  
is badly ~~diseased~~ diseased but hope  
I shall be fully prepared when my end  
comes

Mrs M.<sup>3</sup> health is about the same  
she coughs a great deal and feels weak

Our association was pleasant and will  
long be remembered by us In fact our  
whole visit was pleasant both going and  
coming. The little bluster on the sea that  
made many of us sick enabling us to see  
the contents of our stomachs was probably  
all for the better But preparing us for  
to enjoy ourselves the better when we  
got ashore, Afflictions in life are not  
always to be considered bad they are  
schools to prepare us for higher pleasures
