What We Learned in 2009-2010

Nearly **one out of every four** residents in Washington County are considered low-income.

An estimated **3,500 homeless children** are attending local public schools each day.

51,573 members of our community are living below the Federal Poverty Level.

The number of people living in poverty grew by nearly **three times** the rate of the total population growth.

Washington County job growth decreased by 38%.

On any given night, 1,383 individuals can be counted living on local streets.

Children make up **nearly half** of the county's poverty population.

Child Care Resource & Referral



A family of three with one working parent will spend an average of \$11,784 every year paying for child care.

Connecting parents with safe, affordable and certified child care options.

By linking families with providers they can trust, parents can go to work knowing their kids have a safe and meaningful place to spend their time away from home and school.

Community Action helps create jobs by offering valuable training and resources to child care professionals. The program is committed to maintaining an established network of certified, quality centers and individuals throughout Washington and Columbia counties.

Registered providers participate in ongoing personal career development, ensuring positive places for children to learn and grow .

Energy & Emergency Rent Assistance

Helping families maintain one of the most basic of human needs - a decent place to live.


By receiving short-term financial assistance from Community Action, families with eviction papers and shut-off notices are given a chance to get back on their feet.

For many people, the need for emergency services is temporary. A safe and comfortable home plays an essential role in taking the initial step toward financial stability.

When eligible families benefit from emergency services in conjunction with other agency resources, they are often equipped to bridge the gap between daunting uncertainty and successful long-term self-sufficiency.

Ensuring that families have a place to call home.

Self-sufficiency begins with a safe and affordable place to live. When housing needs are met, parents have the solid foundation they need to address other life challenges and build a stable and productive future for their children.

Community Action's Hillsboro Family Shelter is a place of hope for families facing the dire circumstances of homelessness. The agency is the lead partner in our local shelter network and an active participant in collaborative community initiatives that focus on long-term solutions to make housing accessible and affordable for everyone.

Opening Doors

Connecting pregnant women with the resources they need for healthy births and successful parenting.

By reaching out to pregnant women and eliminating barriers to health care, Community Action supports new mothers in giving their babies the best chance for a healthy and productive life.

As the Washington County partner for **Healthy Start**, Community Action also provides one-on-one support and training for new parents seeking to improve their skills and knowledge. By stabilizing young families early, the risk of child abuse and neglect decreases. Healthy families are more likely to achieve self-sufficiency when they are connected with the right resources at critical times.

Weatherization

Finding solutions in making every home as energy efficient as possible.

Discovering ways to save money is crucial for families living on limited budgets, and it starts at home by eliminating unnecessary energy costs. Community Action provides audits of energy use for homeowners and then fuels the economy by hiring contractors in the area to make improvements at little or no cost to families.

Conservation workshops teach renters and homeowners how to monitor their energy usage and maximize the efficiency of their homes by making small adjustments in everyday items and routines. By lowering the cost of utility bills, families are often able to get ahead on any other demanding financial challenges, and continue on the path toward self-sufficiency.






