The other half of the program will be at the West Hills Unitarian Fellow-Ship pre-school buildings in Metzger where a two-day-a-week volunteer school was conducted last year. Served at Metzger is the Tri-City, Matzger-Garden Home suburban area.

In the preliminary surveys of site locations, we have found community interest and cooperation to be what can only be described as excellent. At the risk of complemency, and a certain blowing of our own horn, we point to the successful summer program at Manning as some basis for the community and perental enthusiasm we have found in establishing a full year program at Banks. Enthusiasm and interest in the Metzger area was built in.

<u>MORK AND TRAINING MENS:</u> Since beginning as Work and Training Officer for CAP I have Learned it is not finding jobs for people, but instead finding people for jobs; besides going to the employment office every day and obtaining a list of 20+ jobs, we also began to contact employers directly.

In attending the meeting at the Oregon State Department of Labor, we met with Roy Ziegler for an orientation of current Oregon Labor. We went to the Labor Department and obtained the new directory of Oregon Manufactories which is excellent.

We have had the first training session for all the centers staff and now they will be referring people to us for screening and placeant. There are 2 sets of 40 slides ordered for use in training in the centers prior to placing people in employment. Retta Knothe
