Also a brief expression of what you think of the old college and its future and what it means to you. From the beginning it stood for a college course, which was such according to eastern standards.

Inevitably it has dropt much out of my life. But there are several reasons why I claim a special interest in it. I presume that my brother, Cyrus Hamlin Walker, and I are the only living persons who witnessed the raising of the log-school house in the summer of 1849, and the frame of Tuelstin Academy a year or two later, attended school (over)

in the log school house, and services in the old log church, and heard the Academy bell, the very first time it rang in the ~~chapel~~ ^{cupola} of the academy building. It was imported, originally by Roman Catholic fathers, from Europe; and few sweeter-toned bells can be found. When quite a small boy I was sent one evening with a note to Prof. Sidney H. Marsh (Dr. Marsh), which informed him that my father and mother had decided to donate 13 and a fraction acres to Pacific University. The dividing line between Father Clark's and my father's farms ran east and west through the hall of the Academy building.

In the summer of 1859 I decided to study for the ministry. I was then 13; and this was the beginning of a regular course of study in the academy and the college. At that time the college course seemed unsettled and I did not definitely know when I entered either college or academy. But I knew when I graduate from college; and when I went east to Bangor Theo. Sem. I easily held my own with other college graduates.

One of the earliest students was Cyrus T. Lacey. His father had been a physician in Oregon City. Cyrus came on foot to us from Oregon City, wheeling his trunk before him on a wheel barrow. But he could not get along with, -well, I won't say who, -and after about two years became discouraged and quit. Only a very few intimate friends knew why!

Cushing Ellis, J. M. Keeler, E. D. Sheddick (Judge Sheddick)

S. H. Marsh were names to be treasured as those who were my teachers in Boyhood, with Prof. Horace Lyman, Prof. E. A. Tanner, Pres. Marsh. in Academy and college. Even as a small boy Rev. Thomas Condon interested me in geology; but I came a little too early to come directly under the instruction of Profs Collier and Joseph Marsh.

I inclose here with draft on Boston for \$50. which I give one third each as picneer, alumnus and property owner in Forest Grove.
