It's hard to believe that we have just completed another program year and are already days into the 2007 – 2008 program year! My...how time flies! I myself always enjoy this time of year. We look back at all the "good" we have done for the community and look forward to how we can improve on our services in the coming year.

Looking Back: We had a good year with he fairly significant changes.

- ❖ As an Agency we served approximately 30,000 children, women & men.
- * We closed the Energy & Emergency Rent office in King City and opened a new office in Beaverton.
- Over 14,000 individuals contacted 211*Info* for resource information.
- ❖ The Fiscal, Facilities and IT staff moved out of the Main Office and moved into an office in Forest Grove.
- ❖ We added the Energy Educator component to the Weatherization Program.
- ❖ Jerralynn took a well deserved Sabbatical after working for the agency for over 30 years!
- ❖ Head Start served 983 children in the Full Day Pre-K, Part Day Pre-K and Early Head Start.
- ❖ Marilyn Harrison resigned as Director of Child Development − she had been with the agency for 24 years! Farzana Siddiqui was promoted to the Director position!

- ❖ The Washington County Safety Levy passed which was significant for the Housing & Homeless Services Network and the families served.
- ❖ Leslea Smith, Regional Director of Legal Aid Services of Oregon, ended her two year term as our Board Chair.
- ❖ Child Care Resource & Referral provided 1,970 parents with child care referrals and provided training for 3,775 child care providers.

Looking Ahead:

- ❖ Head Start received State expansion dollars which will allow us to serve an additional 162 children.
- Energy & Emergency Rent will receive an increase in funding to assist more families with their energy bills.
- Kevin Aguirre, Washington County Department of Human Services District
- Manager, will begin his two year term as our Board Chair.
- ❖ Weatherization will be adding 3 auditors to their staff to increase the number of families that receive help keeping their homes safe, warm and dry.
- ❖ We have developed a Strategic Plan that will guide the work we do for the next three years.
- ❖ Each program will continue to improve program services to best meet the needs of the community we serve.

Tips

For the gardeners among us, here's a recipe worth having:

A safe, environmentally friendly insecticidefungicide can be made from

5 Tablespoons of any vegetable oil

1 TBS. of baking soda

4 TBS. of liquid dish soap mixed in 1 gallon of

and sprayed on the plant. Remove noxious weeds to lessen nutrient competition to your crop.



Cherry Barbecue Sauce

1/3 cup orange juice

1 tsp. cornstarch

2 1/2 Tbs. vegetable oil

1 medium shallot, finely chopped

2/3 cup cherry preserves

1/4 cup ketchup

1/4 cup cider vinegar

1/4 tsp. cayenne pepper

1/8 tsp. ground coriander

Whisk together juice and cornstarch in bowl. ½ Tbs. oil in saucepan over medium-low heat. Add shallot and sauté 3 to 5 minutes, or until softened. Stir in preserves, ketchup, vinegar, cayenne, coriander and orange juice mixture, and bring to a boil. Simmer 10 to 12 minutes, or until sauce is glossy, stirring frequently. Season to taste with salt and pepper.

Electricity

90 percent of total electricity used by a standard incandescent lightbulb is wasted as heat.

By replacing one incandescent lightbulb with a compact fluorescent bulb 1000 pounds of carbon dioxide is not emitted into the atmosphere over the bulb's lifetime.

- 3 = the number of hours a television can be powered with the energy saved from a recycled aluminum can.
- 3 = the cubic yards of landfill space saved by one ton of recycled paper.
- 3 = the number of months worth of thrown-away aluminum that could be recycled to replace the entire U.S. commercial air fleet.

Lighting

Turn off lights when you are not using them. One 100-watt bulb left on all night costs about \$25 over twelve months.

Switch from incandescent light bulbs to compact fluorescent lamps.

With an incandescent bulb 90% of the energy used is wasted as heat-only 10% is converted to light. CFLs use about a fourth as much electricity and last ten times longer than incandescent bulbs, which can be especially useful in hard-to-reach fixtures, where you won't have to replace CFLs for about 5 years.

The EPA estimates that a typical household would save \$80 each year by switching to CFLs throughout the house.

Put compact fluorescent bulbs in hard-to-reach fixtures. You won't have to replace them for about 5 years! Replace halogen torchieres with energy star labeled compact fluorescent torchieres.

Keep bulbs clean. Dust can cut light output by as much as 25%.

Check sales. Especially during National Energy Month in October. Stores often have sale prices on fluorescent bulbs.
