The Index wishes to call the attention of the students to the concerts to be given by W. Waugh Lauder, under the auspices of the Conservatory, on Wednesday and Thursday of this week. As has already been said in these columns Mr. Lauder is a musician of national reputation and we may confidently expect that he will give us a rare treat. He is an artist of great skill and the beauty and feeling which are expressed in his playing appeal to all, even to those who have had no musical training. As an uplifting influence a concert by a true artist is in valuable and no student can afford to miss an opportunity which comes so seldom. Professor Chapman has shown much enterprise in securing Mr. Lauder, but at the same time he has undertaken a financial risk. He has given a heavy guarantee and is dependent largely upon the students in paying the expenses incurred. If these concerts are well attended we may hope to have more high grade entertainments in the future; if they are not the Conservatory will not feel justified in repeating the experiment. In order to secure attractions of real merit in the future, if for no other reason, we ought to give our patronage liberally to the two concerts and the lecture to be given by Mr. Lauder.

Basketball Preparations.

Girls Basket-ball.

A number of fouls were made on both sides but the goalthrowers of the respective teams were unable to make good.
