I would be remiss to write this article and not acknowledge the terrible human devastation from Hurricane Katrina or the connection that this tragedy has with poverty in America and the debate that the aftermath has produced. Some say that America's inability to effectively vacuate New Orleans underscores Jur ineptness in effectively addressing American poverty. I think this is true. I'm intrigued by the following thoughts: "We think they are, but natural disasters are not equal opportunity disasters. The invisible poor in New Orleans were told, like everyone else, to evacuate----but

had no means to do so— no cars, no credit cards, no money, and no nothing. Those of us in the dominant culture in this country were blind to that reality. White privilege and socio-economic privilege is called "privilege" because it means that I don't see and don't have to see the realities

### **Recipes -** Apple Crisp

5	Granny Smith	apples,	peeled	and sliced
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ABC

- 1 C. brown Sugar, packed
- 3/4 C. quick or long cooking oats

3/4 C. flour

1 t. cinnamon

ng oats 1 t. nutmeg

ABC

1/4 C. butter, softened 1/4 C. apple cider or juice

Preheat oven to 375F. Grease a 9" x 9" pan. Put half of the apples in pan. Blend together remaining ingredients, except juice. Crumble half the sugar mixture over the apples. Cover with remaining apples and sugar mixture. Pour juice over top. Bake 35 minutes.

## HR - Ask Winnie Benefits, Diversity...



### Did you know?

If you are an employee who is scheduled to work 20 + hrs/week, has more than 2 yrs. of service, and has family medical coverage, then from 10-1-04 to 9-30-05 you will have received a tax-free benefit of \$9,672.98. From 10-1-05 to 9-30-06 you will have received a tax-free benefit of \$10,646.28 (based on 12 month calculations). These are dollars paid for you, but which you do not have to claim as income (and do not pay income tax), but you do benefit from them. And this is only the medical premium benefit. The amount increases when you add the dental premium, agency contributions to your 403(b) plan, & life insurance premiums. All of these together are considered "Total Compensation".

### Leave of Absence for medical reasons:

This is a very complicated area of policy because the agency is required to comply with both State of Oregon and with Federal regulations. These regulations are not identical. One of the most confusing things is the question "when am I eligible?". The basic information as to when you should ask for FMLA or OFLA (definition of a serious illness, and, family member designation) are listed in the employee handbook. What might be more confusing to staff is the eligibility test based on number of

hours worked in a certain period of time. That period of time is the immediate preceding 6 months at date of the request for Oregon OFLA and the immediate preceding 12 months for Federal. Oregon typically requires 6 consecuti months of employment during which the employee has 180 days and averaged 25 hrs/week. The federal requirement is that the employee must have worked 1250 hours in the preceeding 12 month period at the date of the request. Hours worked does not include any sick, vacation, holiday or personal day which you may have received pay, but did not work. If you request 2 separate OFLA or FMLA leaves in a 12-month period, we must calculate the hours worked eligibility for each request. This may result in your being given leave at one time but not another, or it might mean you are eligible both times, or you are not eligible either time. If you are on an intermittent OFLA/FMLA leave and it lasts longer than 12 months; the hours worked eligibility calculation is done on the anniversary of the first FMLA/OFLA request to establish eligibility for the next 12 months.

This is a very simplistic explanation of the eligibility requirements and of course there are exceptions for certain circumstances. It is very important that you, your supervisor and HR work closely together to ensure that any medical leave of absence request is administered correctly no matter if it is OFLA, FMLA, ADA, or something else not mentioned here, and that you understand your eligibility before the leave starts.
