Ern and I do not believe that Harvey Clark ever had 2 claims at Forest Grove. Had just the one he bought from Ornes Brown - paying too bu. of wheat for it. Hardly likely that the name of Ornes O. appears on the records in connection with that. Some held their claims several years before filing papers on them. Ornes must have held his claim just long enough to grow a crop on it to "try the land" which we know that he did in 1844 then sold out to Clark. If he ^{had} filed papers to this claim he could not have taken another claim north of town as he did when he returned in 1846.

Bell's niece Mildred James works in Court House - Hillsboro. She said that old names mentioned by Ern and me were familiar to her as she had often seen them on the records.

May be she could tell you about the cost of looking up records. It costs

plenty. We have to give an abstract with all the property we sell - goes back to government ownership.

Elsworth Wilkes was long in the abstract business at Hillsboro but has passed away.

Seems like your historic papers should be left with Pacific U., but if not there, then with the Oregon Historical Society, 235 S.W. Market St. Portland I., Oregon.
