I, C. H. Walker being first duly sworn depose and say that I was living near Warm Spring Indian Agency in the State of Oregon, when William W. Dougherty took charge of the Agency as United States Indian Agent on January, 1st, 1888. That I was selected to represent the interests of retiring Agent of the Agency, Jason Wheeler, and Charles L. Dougherty was selected to represent the interests of Agent William W. Dougherty, and together we took as thorough an inventory of the Government property as was possible at that season of the year, with weather cold and snow on the ground. It was quite the question to gather up all of the Government cattle, as a number out on the range or in the timber for shelter, but as far as known number carried on Agent Wheeler's returns were all alive at the beginning of the winter, hence they were received for by the incoming agent. In a few weeks after this there was experienced the coldest weather I had ever known during the more than ten years residing or near the Warm Spring Agency. The mercury went down to 25° or more below zero, and snow was deep and travel was difficult. More or less stock perished during the intense cold weather, and there must certainly have been some loss among the Government cattle, but which could not be determined or ascertained until late in the spring; when the annual "round up" of stock was made by the Indians. Before this took place Agent William W. Dougherty had resigned on account of ill health, and had left the Agency, accompanied by his son Charles L. Dougherty, who felt it his duty to go also so as to take care of his aged father.

Mr. S.A. Lester, the Agency clerk was left in charge as was understanding, of the Agency property. Not long after this Agent Henry Heath arrived with instructions (as I am quite positive I heard him say) to receipt for the Government property, but he failed

to do so, giving as a reason, if I remember aright, that he did expect to remain long. During his stay of several months he made quite extensive improvements at the Agency, doing more to improve the appearances of the buildings than had been done during all of the previous years of residence there. He had the Indians work the agency roads and clean out the race at the saw-mill, and S.A.Lester told me some time after that the 5,000 lbs of flour not accounted for when transfer was made to Agent Butler, was issued to the Indians while doing this work, by direction of Special Agent Heath, but no receipts were taken from the Indians, as should have been done.

As there was no government sawyer at the Agency, Agent Lester employed me to run the saw-mill and take lumber for my pay. In assistance of a number of Indian school boys and two or three persons logs were cut and hauled, many of them nearly two miles to the mill and upwards of 40,000 feet of lumber was sawed of which I received

one-fourth. From my subsequent experience as superintendent of the Agency Boarding School, I know that the usual school rations are sufficient for stout able bodied Indian boys as these were when we worked as hard as they did in order to keep me in sawlogs, and I can well believe that much, if not all, of the supplies expended on Voucher No 9 Abstract F, Second quarter, 1888, Agent Dougherty's accounts, were used by the school boys, and the policemen helping them.

As to the items of sale of subsistence to employ during Agent Dougherty's term of service aggregating \$209.95, I have no certain knowledge as to why they were not placed to the credit of the United States, required by law. For a number of years previous to this time I was clerk at Warm Spring Agency. The usual custom was to deduct the amount due from any employees for subsistence purchased, from his pay at the end of the quarter, and write out a check for the same. Another check for the balance was given to the employee. If I am mistaken, the employees were paid by the Agent Dougherty for the

ending March 31st, 1888, just previous to his departure, and i  
 clerk collected the several amounts due as he should have done; the bla  
 me evidently rests on him, for thier not being properly accounted for.  
 The amounts due for the second quarter and first fractional third quar-  
 ter, 1888, were ~~payable~~ probably not collected for the reason of I re-  
 member aright, that the employees received their pay in Treasurey Draf-  
 ts from United States Treasurer at Washington, and the clerk had no  
 chance to collect, thought it was his duty to make the demand. As I  
 was a Republican I was with the "outs", but I had a pretty good idea of  
 all that was transpiring from knowledge gained by previous experience  
 as an employee, and taking all the circumstances together, it is sin-  
 cere and firm belief that neither William W. Dougherty or his  
 resenatives should be held accountable for any losses that ma  
 accrued during his term of service as Agent at the Warm Sgring  
 I believe as long as he remained at the agency his son Char-  
 herty did all that he could to assist his father in having the  
 ment work carried on in all its branches and had they remained  
 the property was turned over to a successor there would have been  
 clear receipt given to Agent Dougherty.
