SUBJECT: Cabinet Meeting

Hull: Drilling at Mist showing success for Northwest Natural Gas. Arco will be starting some drilling also.

Land Board: Submerged and submersible fees adopted. Discussions underway with Riedel and Port of Portland.

Hansen: East Multnomah County hearings are being conducted on sewer plan. Seepage fee for those using septic tanks is the most controversial. \$250m to lay lines, not including hookup and line to residences.

Met and discussed wood stove regulation with EPA who is thinking about national regulation for reasons of health hazards. Statistics show wood smoke is a large contributor to cancer.

Reviewing budget impacts of SB 523.

Donaldson: Produced publication "Plague of Plastics" addressing the danger of plastic debris to wildlife. (See attached.) Clean up effort on the coast October 13.

At Winchester fish are getting through tubes but falling back and killing themselves. Appears there needs to be a smaller grate.

State Parks: All quiet. Attendance up a little bit.

Wolfe: Expo 86 kickoff very successful. Explained new fall advertising campaign featuring Orson Welles. Meeting with HUD in D.C. on Eagle Picher to force approval of UDAG. Looks like several things must happen: change of HUD rules, release more money, stronger recognition of needs in West, elimination of criteria based on 1979-80 population growth.

Freightliner is getting more and more serious about moving to East Coast. EDD fact gathering and will involve Governor. Move of corporate headquarters (800 to 1,000 employes). Production operation would stay here.

Ross: Heliport proposed location denied. Pat and Ross will begin discussions with FAA, Ted Millar, City of Portland, to identify alternative site.

Goddard: Power Council approved hydro assessments
consistent with Pat's instructions.

Agriculture: Apple maggot problem in Wasco County. Going to E Board for \$75,000 to fight problem. California has not yet quarantined Oregon for gypsy moth yet -- but is likely eventually.
