NORTH PLAINS - HEAD START PROGRESS REPORT - IMPRESSIONS OF THE STAFF:

The overall picture is beginning to take shape nicely here in my room. I am constantly anazed at the progress that these kids are making in their adjustments to each other and to the adults in the room. Some who were shy and wouldn't talk to anyone at the beginning of the program, are now in the middle of everything. They are constantly learning new and better ways of working together, and are progressing very nicely in their daily schedule.

The main problem is in getting the cnes here who need the program most. I must say that Mrs. Selmann has done an outstanding job of selling the program to the mothers that I have seen. The four who came to visit this morning, were more than enthuastic about the whole thing. One mother of a child who is going to repeat first grade was very pleased with the progress that the child was making.

I would like to add, that my aides, both paid and volunteer, have been wonderful. They are the means of spreading myself over a much larger area than would have beenpossible under any other circumstances. They have made it possible to do in three weeks, what it would have taken several more to do in ordinary teaching.

The aides are good - they keep their eyes open to any opportunity to help, to relieve, to see detail, and to assist anywhere there is a need. Personally, I don't see how the program could succeed without them - certainly not with this scope. As far as I personally am concerned, this is thenost gratifying teaching job that I have had in many years.
