The 2010 – 2015 Consolidated Plan describes community needs and determines local priorities for using public resources to assist low and moderate income residents of Washington County

The Anti-Poverty Strategies are based on the expressed concerns of low-income residents of Washington County!

There are three Anti-Poverty Strategies:

Strategy 1. Public Policy

Implement innovative public policy that affirmatively seeks new ways to promote the economic independence and wellbeing of low income residents.

Strategy 2. Service & Support Systems

Provide comprehensive and integrated services that focus on prevention and are strongly consumer driven.

Strategy 3. Civic Capital

Increase sense of community and belonging among low income and minority residents as well as overall public investment in the social and political wellbeing of the entire community.

- Community Action has been identified in the plan as the lead to establish an Anti-Poverty Strategies Work Group to:
 - monitor the progress of the strategies
 - address barriers
 - respond to changing conditions as they arise

There are many Action Items outlined for the group to work on over the next five years.

A few of the Action Items are:

 Increase awareness of poverty issues among community leaders

- Address the "cliff effect" and other disincentives to transitioning off services and moving toward greater independence and self sufficiency
- Improve Information & Referral infrastructure to increase consumer awareness and understanding of available resources

 Identify existing efforts and key partners that will increase opportunities for communication, collaboration and coordination between groups that fund organizations and agencies to undertake anti-poverty efforts.

The Anti-Poverty Strategies Work Group began meeting in July 2010

The back ground information we are working with comes from our 2010 Washington County Issues of Poverty While Washington County's population grew 20% between 2000 & 2008, the poverty population grew at nearly three times that rate (58%). Nearly 1 in 4 Washington County residents (24%) are low-income. In 2009 the poverty level for a family of three was \$18,310 annually, yet a single parent **working full time** earning Minimum Wage had an annual income of only \$17,472.

For a family of three to afford a 2 bedroom apartment in Washington County at the 2010 Fair Market Rate, family must have an annual income of \$33,560, which is 165% of the Federal Poverty Level.
