

A DIFFERENCE IN ONE LIFE

Hi, my name is Angel. I have a lot to share and only a few minutes to paint you a picture, so please try to envision everything I am about to share. My mother worked very hard and suffered with depression and still tried very hard to raise 4 children alone. We were poor and sometimes could barely afford food because all the money my mom made went to rent and heat and what little food we did have. I was a latch key kid for as long as I can remember. I left home when I was 16 and vowed never to return!

"I found this world full of excitement for awhile. Then, I started to realize how it really was out there on the streets, where I had chosen to be. Scared and alone and already addicted to meth for two years, I knew I had to learn to survive. I lived with strangers, drug dealers, in cars and even in parks. At the age of 18 I got married thinking the man I married was my knight in shining armor. I was wrong. Both of us addicted to drugs, we went our separate ways. Now, I was alone with a newborn baby. Making only \$5.00 an hour and no help from her father, how were we to survive living place to place?

"I wanted so badly to learn something different about life, but feeling hopeless and hungry for something in life. But, I had no idea what to do or how to do it. I have lived on the streets of nine different states and countless cities. I didn't know the meaning of stability, structure and nesting.

"When I got to Oregon I was starting over once again. Hungry and homeless I

weighed 75 pounds and was barely alive. My five-year-old daughter Kayla kept asking me when we were going home. HOME! We had no home! Looking into her beautiful eyes, it was then that I asked God for help. That was when I knew what I needed to do. I put myself into detox and then into a six month residential treatment center for women with children. From there I went to a transitional home, to work on my living and parenting skills and to continue outpatient treatment for six more months. I was accepted into Community Action's Hopespring program that helps women with children for one year with their housing costs and daycare

expenses so they can work to become self-sufficient. Not only did the Hopespring program give me the support I needed to financially get by, I was also given a family advocate, Martha Westfall, to help ensure I was staying on track and meeting my goals. If it had not been for the social service support and all of the services I would not be here today. I would not have the home my baby was asking me for, and we wouldn't have such a wonderful, healthy, loving, trusting relationship like we do now.

"I work as an Americorps VISTA.
VISTA stands for Volunteers in Service to
America. I have chosen to dedicate two
years of my life to service. I am working
for a small living allowance \$600 month
and earning scholarships for school. I am
working with low-income pregnant
women through the Opening Doors
program of Community Action. The
support I've received from Community
Action has transformed my life and given
my daughter and I hope for the future."

It is the purpose of this Act to strengthen, supplement, and coordinate efforts in furtherance of that policy." CAO remains dedicated to the principals of the original EOA.

Shelter to Reopen!

shelter facility in Tigard, formerly known as The RITE Center, was built to serve homeless people in east Washington County. The former program operator closed the shelter in February due to lack of capacity to operate. Community Action Organization, in collaboration with the newly formed East Washington County Shelter Partnership Council and the Washington County Office of Community Development, will re-open the shelter this September. The County will lease the facility to CAO and provide about half of the first year's operating funds. The cities of Beaverton, Tigard and Tualatin have committed to funding support. CAO will be responsible for program operations for the first year. The Council will raise the funds needed for future years and will establish a non-profit organization to take responsibility after the first year. They will also provide volunteers to help operate the shelter program. If you are interested in volunteering, please call 693-3254.
