# DIRECTOR'S CORNER

As you know, Jerralynn is on sabbatical and will return in November. When I realized that I would need to write something for her column, I thought you might like to know about some of the preliminary numbers that we've collected on the "Great" work we accomplished during our past fiscal year. Each year, when I see this information it makes me very proud to be working for an agency that accomplishes so much for so many in our community. Remember these are preliminary numbers — the final numbers may differ slightly.

- KidZone Provided before & after school aged care to 31 children in Forest Grove School District
- Child Care Resource & Referral –
  Provided 1,540 families with child care
  referrals, trained 1,390
  providers/teachers which represents
  11,934 hours of training
- Early Head Start/Head Start Served 861 children, 329 of those children will be entering Kindergarten this fall!
- Energy & Emergency Rent Assistance-Provided energy assistance to 7,452 families and provided rent assistance to 553 households preventing evictions
- Housing & Homeless Services –
   Provided 5,421 shelter bed nights to 52
   families
- Information & Referral 235 people attended the I&R Breakfast Network meetings
- Opening Doors Provided 106 women with comprehensive prenatal services, 91% of babies were born with healthy birth weights, 121 first time families received parenting support

- Weatherization Provided comprehensive weatherization to 186 homes making them more energy efficient and provided an additional 626 home with energy efficient base load measures
- Development Recorded over 8,000 hours of volunteer service to the agency and raised approximately \$800,000 in restricted, unrestricted and budget relief in kind

Remember this is just a partial list of the work that we accomplished last year! Our Fiscal Department & Human Resources Department are still working on their year-end accomplishments and I will report on those in the next edition. Thank you so much for all the work you do, on a daily basis to make life easier for the people we are here to serve.

### Topics - Stress Reduction Exercises

You can do these in your car, at your desk, anywhere, to reduce the painful tension stress can cause.

1. Bend your head forward so that your chin is resting on your chest. Massage your temples slowly with your fingers in a clockwise direction for 10 deep circles. Repeat going counter clockwise.

2. Bring your head up and press one ear against your shoulder, keeping your shoulder still. Repeat on the other side.

3. Rotate your right shoulder 6 times in a large circle, forwards and backwards. Repeat on the other side. Finish by reaching upwards with each arm as high and as straight as you can. All the time, concentrate on what you are doing. Breathe slowly and deeply with each movement. —

### **Tips for Kitchen Cleaning**

I hate to clean my kitchen. So I collect tips to make it easier. Here are two of them:

- 1. For stovetop safe pans: "Deglaze" the empty pan with water, adding dish soap if you want,
- 2. For Pyrex and other pans not stovetop safe: Fill pan halfway with water. Cover the pan with plastic wrap and microwave it 3 to 5 minutes, until water is bubbling. Remove from microwave but keep covered for an additional 5 minutes. Then carefully remove the plastic wrap and wash the pan as usual.

### Recipes: Chicken Adobo\* - Lolita Valez

- In medium sized pot, sauté <u>4 cloves garlic</u>, finely chopped, in <u>1 T oil</u>
   <u>2 T soy sauce</u> until lightly brown.
- 2. Add 1 lb chicken wingetts, 1 C vinegar, ½ C water, ½ tsp black peppercorns & remaining 2 T soy sauce to sautéed garlic. Cover & let simmer for 45 minutes on low/medium heat.
- 3. Serve hot over rice and enjoy!

### FAMILY & COMMUNITY RESOURCES



Welcome to New Parent Network!

People often wonder, "Just what is New Parent Network"? Or perhaps you've heard the name, but you aren't sure just what we do. Well, New Parent Network is a home visiting program for first time parents that focuses on parent education. Our ultimate goal is to prevent child abuse by giving more education to parents who have certain stressors or risk factors in their lives. The families we work with are served from birth through the child's third birthday. The program is staffed by five Family Support Workers, and administered by the NPN Supervisor, and we are a part of the Opening Doors program. We primarily work out of the Beaverton Opening Doors office, but we also have staff working out of "La Casita" at Virginia Garcia in Cornelius. Our group is just one part of the Washington County New Parent Network Collaboration, which includes LifeWorks NW, Lutheran Community Services NW, Oregon Human Development Coalition, Washington County Department of Health & Human Services and the Commission on Children and Families. New Parent Network is part of the statewide Healthy Start Program, which is part of the federal "Healthy Families America" initiative. Now don't you feel like you are "in the know"? #### Energy and Emergency Rent Assistance

Our program continues to help many low-income families who are facing eviction or needing help with move in costs with emergency rent assistance. April through June 2006 our King City office served 67 households with an average payment of \$294. During that same time period our Hillsboro office served 87 households with the same average payment of \$294. Our King City office received 224 calls during that time period - the 67 households we assisted, represents a mere 29% of clients that called for help. At our Hillsboro office there were 1,012 inquiries for rent assistance - the 87 households we assisted represents an even more startling rate of only 9% of the clients calling for assistance. The families we are able to assist prevents them from becoming homeless yet the unmet need (those we are unable to assist) paints an astonishing picture of the increasing difficulties our low-income families are facing as the try to maintain a stabilized housing situation.
