Some 32 pre-schoolers about recived their D.P.T. and measles shots, small pox vaccinations and oral polio vaccine. An interesting sidelight was the volunteer help of Mrs. Maxime Sweetman who was on hand to help and inform the mothers about the Family Plannin Clinic conducted every third Tuesday at the Health Department. Maxime found-alot of interest and was most helpful.

It should be noted here that Dr. Stewart and his staff have visited the Timber and Sherwood Centers and discussed health programs and services with the local people, and plans are in the books to meet with the people in the North Plains and Gaston-Cherry Grove areas. These meetings have been both informative and productive and have led to a set program for Immunization and Well Baby Clinics on a more scheduled basis in each of the four areas. More about this next month. A specia "thank you" is in order to Dr. Stewart's initiative in bringing the services of the Health Department to the outlying areas.

INTER-AGENCY COOPERATIVE HUDDLE: It takes only a few leaders to spar's teders the process of forming a cooperative. Usually these leaders are several friends, who have a common problem or goal, that they cannot solve or reach individually. They talk their problems over informally, decide that othere in their area may have the same problem and that a cooper-ative might solve it. This is how people get together to form any co-

"The "problem" really is people - the people of our county. who are in some way or other affected by our various and many agencies. In many instances these people are clients of the Welfare Department, Health Department, Sheriff's Office, the Schools. Juvenile Department. Ministerial Association, CAP, etc. Because the problem is the same what better way to understand it than for the service reople from the various departments to get together, pool their attitudes. viewpoints, philosophies. in an informal setting where everyone enjoys freedom of expression. without the threat of mockery, indictment or inter-agency vendettas, This is the explanation of both the orgin and purpose of what I would call the Inter-Agency Cooperative Huddle that meets every other Thursday for a lunch-discussion at the First Congregational Church, 5th & Main, Hillsboro. Some 32 peoplo have showed up for the past two sessions and interest seems to be growing. Due to this large turn out we were compeled to move the meeting from the CAP office to the new location. Such topics as sex education, family planning, drugs have been touched on already.

I especially like that word "huddle". Like a football team. getting ready to make it's play, it is our guarentee of no one else knowing about the 'plays' we call in helping ourselves understand the people, and problems we are all concerned about. From this kind of open and frank exchange of ideas, all of us should benefit. But it is hoped that the people we work with, should benefit most of all. This is our only reason for getting together. So if you too are an agency person, why not join us? This is for you. It is not a public forum.
